So Then I had to decide how to talk about them, and I decided to do this in a chronological order by Stardates. This means -- Enterprise, TOS, TNG, DS9 and then Voyager. So let's get to it shall we?

Some of my favorite episodes are the ones that involved "Trip". And the one I remember most is him getting pregnant.

The hilarity and the absurdity of

"Unexpected" made it almost believable (if you have a healthy suspension of disbelief such as I do.) That country boy's look when he



was told by Phloxx that he was expecting

was priceless. The comedic exploration of the Trip character was IMHO very well done and created openings for other plot hooks to surround him during the latter parts of the series.

The episode of TOS that I most have enjoyed over the years would have to be "City on the edge of Forever" this brings the Duo of Kirk and Spock chasing McCoy thru



The Guardian of Forever back in time to fix the change in the timeline. In this episode I found some of what I considered to be Shatner's most

convincing roles as Kirk, Playing an equally compelling role as Edith Keeler was Joan Collins a fine actress who at times was underrated, I think, in her skills.

Now we come to TNG where I have many episodes of which I enjoyed greatly, but I would have to say one of my favorites is "The Offspring" this is in season 3 and was a



great morality play on the rights of an individual as well as character development for Data, the scene at the end where Admiral Haftell

speaks about Data's efforts to save Lal, to me was a very moving performance.

So in DS9 one of the best most likely for me would have to be either "Children of Time" or "Our Man Bashir".

In "Children of Time" the defiant crew land to find they are among their own

descendants, having been thrown back in time when trying to leave. It's another morality play about consequences of your actions. I think it demonstrates nice writing surrounding the Sisko character and the decision he will have to make vs. the decision he could make.

"Our Man Bashir" is a one of the few holodeck "mis"-adventure episodes in DS9 where Bashir has been playing a spy with a new holosuite program he acquired, and while he's in the program, Garak breaks in

and talks his way into becoming a sidekick -- of sorts. The mis part of the adventure comes to play



when the other main cast members have a transporter malfunction and end up getting written into the holosuites memory buffers overwriting the slots of the other "npc" characters of the holoprogram. I especially liked Kira's Soviet fem fatale and O'Brians evil eyepatched bad guy in this holoromp.

Finally we come to Voyager, which episode do I think was my favorite? Well I had to think about this because I haven't watched the voyager series as much as I watched the others... In the end I (and thru a little research) I decided on "Tinker Tenor Doctor Spy" as the one I most enjoyed. The pips

appearing on the color of the "Emergency Command Hologram" are priceless as the Dr. runs his



daydreaming program, and the way he plays the reluctant ECH when it is ordered by Janeway to bluff the Hierarchy ships is very well done. This episode had some

The young romantic girl in me loves *Resolutions* Stardate: 49690.1 (ST:VOY Season 2, Esp. 25, Air date: May 13, 1996). This is the one where Chakotay and Janeway have contracted a deadly virus for which there is no cure, so they are stranded on a planet by the Voyager crew

of their days. Romantic tensions erupt. Meanwhile on Voyager, there are tensions among the crew, too. Many feel bad about leaving the two on the planet and suggest contacting the Vidiians, who are enemies that just want body parts to keep themselves going. It's a trap, but the doctor has a friend in Dr. Denara Pel (played by Susan Diol, who has been in many television shows, including NextGen). Dr. Pel had already discovered a cure, so she secretly transmits the cure to the Doctor aboard Voyager, and away they go to rescue their Captain and First Officer. Janeway and Chakotay pick up where they left off on Voyager as two professional officers.

The Starfleet Marine in me loves the *Year of Hell* (ST:VOY Season 4, Esp. 8 & 9 (2 Parts), Air dates: November 5, 1997 and November 12, 1997). For the crew of Voyager, it was a year of hell. The ship ran into a race called the Krenim who were able to make temporal shifts in time to change past events in order to strengthen the Krenim Imperium. Voyager was an unknown entity to the Imperium. When they first met, the Krenim were in the middle of erasing an entire race called the Zahl from existence. In the blink of an eye, the Zahl were no more, that area of space was controlled by many Krenim warships, the Krenim ships were much larger than before, and Voyager was damaged. The Krenim were going to board Voyager, so Janeway fought back and escaped, but only for a time—a year. From IMDB:

"Krenim scientist Annorax had built incursions" to be used to erase strengthen the Krenim Imperium. also caused a plague which killed wife, and Annorax has been

Annorax decides to destroy Voyager due to the temporal distortions caused by its shields." Annorax was played by Kurtwood Smith (you know him from *That '70s Show* as "Red" Forman).

The crew of Voyager fights many battles and end up hiding in a nebula, from IMDB: "Captain Janeway makes an alliance with two species known as the Nihydron and the Mawasi to attack the Krenim timeship. The remaining crew members move to the allied ships while Janeway remains behind alone on Voyager to pilot the heavily damaged ship herself. With the help of a dissatisfied crew member Chakotay and Paris take the time ship's temporal core offline, rendering it vulnerable to attack, and beam to the nearest allied ship. Unfortunately, even vulnerable and without temporal weaponry, the time ship is too powerful and the allied ships are disabled. Voyager itself is badly damaged when one of the ships crashes over the saucer section of Voyager. Theorizing that the true timeline will be restored if the Krenim ship is destroyed, Janeway orders the fleet to drop their temporal shields and rams Voyager into the time-ship while it is powering up for another temporal incursion, destroying Voyager and causing the time ship's temporal core to destabilize, which erases the ship from history in a

Balance of Terror – Captain Kirk versus the U-Boat

To those who know me, it is no surprise that my favorite episodes of Star Trek tend to be the ones with the martial overtones. Beyond martial, many episodes of the original Star Trek covered topics that would be familiar to the television audience at the time – namely the Vietnam war, racism, and in this case World War II. No, we're not going to talk about *Patterns of Force* and the Space Nazis from Ekos, we're talking about the classic episode *Balance of Terror*.

This episode



introduced the Romulans as opponents to CAPT Kirk and crew – who were not yet distinctly called "The Federation." It

also gave us our first Star Trek episode with Mark Lenard, who would later go on to play Sarek of Vulcan for almost three decades.

What's this episode about? Captain Kirk and company receive distress calls from the "Earth Outposts" along the Romulan Neutral Zone. Investigating, they find that a number of the outposts have been destroyed by some unseen force, with a weapon that can render the hardest metal brittle and delicate. Lieutenant Styles, the navigator, immediately assumes it's the long-unseen Romulans, with whom no contact has been made for over a century when the Romulan War occurred. The Enterprise crew witnesses the next attack,

seeing the enemy ship use a massive plasma weapon of a type they have never seen, and then fade from view. The episode becomes a very close approximation of the classic WWII film "The Enemy Below" as the Enterprise hunts the Romulan ship in the same way the surface vessel hunts the U-Boat. Many of the tropes of the submarine film genre appear here, firing phasers as if they are depth charges, the cloaked vessel disposing of debris to make it look as if they have been destroyed, even the sentiments of the commanders are very similar to those we see in "The Enemy Below" and other sub films.

I will not spoil the ending, or the surprise revelation about the Romulans that most of you probably already know — you'll just have to watch the episode. It's currently available on Netflix streaming for those of you with access to that service. Suffice to say, this is my favorite TOS episode due to the drama, the tension, and the wonderful back-and-forth between CAPT Kirk and the Romulan Commander-



who only share one scene speaking to one another but who seem to be trying to

read each other's minds throughout the chase. It's a great hour of Star Trek, and begins not only Star Trek's association with

future-Sarek, but the involvement of those "other" antagonists, the Romulans.

TRIVIA – The original Romulan Bird of Prey model was stolen after this episode was made, so when the Romulans returned

in "The Enterprise Incident" they had Klingon D-7s painted with the Romulan markings, establishing a Klingon/Romulan technology exchange. The Bird of Prey was, at this point, meant to be exclusively a Romulan

cultural tag for their vessels. In Star Trek III: The Search for Spock, the original script had Kruge stealing the Bird of Prey from the Romulans in order to get his hands on a cloaking device so he could pull off his plot concerning Genesis. This scene was dropped, and the dialogue changed to

indicate that this Bird of Prey was a Klingon vessel. From this point on, both the Klingons and the Romulans had Bird of Prey vessels in their inventory – a move that I have always found lazy, as it dilutes the cultural

distinctions of both enemy races.
